

James Peake:

Glass beads in early Anglo-Saxon England: Production and Origins Thursday, 24th May 2018



Our understanding of the production of glass artefacts in early medieval England between the 5th and 7th centuries is limited. Scientific analysis of a large number of glass beads excavated from the early Anglo-Saxon cemetery complex at RAF Lakenheath (Eriswell), Suffolk, has provided new insights into the ways in which glass was procured and used in early medieval beadmaking. The results have revealed a number of distinct types of glass produced in the 'Roman' glassmaking tradition, which are likely to have their origins in the Near East. Here, large quantities of glass were mass-produced from raw materials by glassmaking institutions situated along the Levantine coast. The results suggest that many of the beads recovered from Anglo-Saxon graves were produced locally using a supply of recycled Roman glass, which was remelted and coloured. However, a large number of beads also appear to have been produced using a supply of freshly produced glass imported from the Near East. Through this, it has been possible to shed light on which glass artefacts are likely to have been made in England, and which are likely to have been imported.

Jim Peake is the Ceramics & Glass specialist at Chiswick Auctions in West London. He trained in Conservation at Cardiff University, before completing a PhD in Archaeological Science in 2013 funded jointly by the Ministry of Defence and the United States Armed Forces. This talk summarises the results of his doctoral research.
